

HOW GOD MADE ME A CRESTRIDGE MAN

When I married Sallie (Garvin) in 1969, I knew she loved God and His work. I also knew she had gone to a camp for several years when she was 11 and 12. However, I did not know about Crestridge or where it was. Then, much to my surprise when we had three children, Tad (7), Jacob (5), and Ramey (3), Sallie told me she wanted them to experience camp just like she had. So we planned a trip to the mountains so we could visit camp. It had been 14 years since Sallie had been to Crestridge. The experience of walking

through the old gate, by the horse ring, and up the long hill toward the dining hall was a little overwhelming for her and just a little frightening to me. As we walked, Sallie was fast explaining to the children what they were seeing, what the campers were doing, and just how special God had made Crestridge. As we

neared the Bear Trap, a beautiful, dark-haired Johnnie Armstrong came straight toward us. I was thinking we were in trouble for coming into camp and I was nervously planning what to say. But, before we could say anything, Johnnie said to Sallie in a strong voice, "Is your last name Garvin and weren't you a camper?" "Yes!!" and before anything else could be said, Johnnie was giving hugs and getting everyone's name and age. An experience that hundreds of "grown-up campers" have experienced. Then Johnnie said, "Larry, what do you do?" I said, "Accounting, and I build houses and I do wood working projects." Johnnie said, "Great. When Ramey starts camp I want you and Sallie to come work. God can use your talents at camp and I need a handy-man." At that moment, God made me a Crestridge Man.

In 1986 Ramey started at Crestridge and Sallie and I began our work at camp. For the next 10 years, Sallie would volunteer for six weeks and I would come every weekend and take three weeks' vacation just to be at camp. I repaired horse gates, barn stalls, and built campfire benches. I made most of the risers used in closing programs. I repaired screen doors, I unstopped toilets, fixed hot water heaters, repaired leaking roofs, braced cabin foundation logs, and built steps up and down hills and cabins. I drove "Butter Cup," the camp pickup to overnights loaded with sleeping bags, food and water. I built more than 40 long benches, which are still all around camp. I even stood watch at night at the top of Cheyenne Hill for a full week, when some staffers thought they saw a man

walking on the back road. I had two flashlights and a small camping ax. I was ready for the unknown. I heard a lot of strange noises and saw one deer, but never saw a man or ghost.

For over 30 years Sallie and I have been volunteering at camp, and now our six grandchildren are enjoying the camp experience.

However, the best part of my time at camp was sharing my faith in God with the campers. Sometimes it was at cabin campfire, or at chapel, or one on one. It always made me warm on the inside when I would share, "Jesus is my Lord and Savior. He died for my sins and He wants to be your Savior also." My eyes still fill with tears of joy when I think of campers who asked Jesus to come into their hearts. Yes, I am a Crestridge Man, saved by God's Grace.
